

IECT Location and Facilities

The Institute of Epidermal Cell Therapy is located at 445 N. Battlefield Blvd. Suite O & H, Chesapeake, Virginia 23320. The building contains 2 classrooms/clinics for its instruction purposes. The clinics include facial beds and facial electronic equipment to augment the practicum portion of the curriculum. The building maintains the necessary fire safety exit signs and extinguishers. The IECT is maintained and managed by the Sheehan Group, Inc. They are responsible for all property management maintenance (ventilation, heat, electricity, plumbing and general building maintenance). The building is leased from The Sheehan Group, Inc. and is under contract with regard to stipulations of terms and lease, which have been executed by The Institute of Epidermal Cell Therapy and The Sheehan Group, Inc.

All examinations and procedures will be completed and taken in the traditional brick and mortar classroom. This site is set up and designed in a manner that reflects conditions in a typical spa and in a clinical setting. Student activities are designed in such a manner that will provide them with as close as practical the settings they most likely will or will have worked in.

The 100% principal owner is Mr. Charles Gee, Jr. There is no governing board for the IECT. Generally, the powers, duties and responsibilities for the President and the Chief Executive Officer, are as follows:



Sexual Harassment 2 of 2

Under these circumstances, the student may opt to review, engage and to complete assignments and/or examinations with special consideration. These considerations typically fall under the category or requirement of the American with Disabilities Act (ADA) - (1990, 2008)

Students who wish to request accommodation that is outside of the normal scope of the curriculum should do so initially during the application process. Admissions and Entrance Requirements

Program Overview

All of the IECT Certificate Programs are geared to ensure that each entry level and prior professional esthetician meet the requirements for state boards as well as industry standards. Our curriculum is strong on the art and science of skin care and epidermal therapy, as well as the psychological, physical, health and business aspects of the industry. Ours is very much a holistic program. Graduates can expect to meet and exceed the expectations of patients, clients, and practitioners.

All examinations will be completed and taken in the traditional brick and mortar classroom. Non-traditional classroom education, include the following courses: orientation, school policies, state laws and regulations, health and safety, personal hygiene, sanitation and sterilization, ethics, salon/shop/parlor/spa management, analyzing skin or scalp conditions, anatomy, client consultation, and care of equipment.

Assessment of Student's competency Award Credit

We will award up to 300 clock hours of credit to students who have demonstrated, through assessment, that they have met the qualifications required by the Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation Board for Barbers and Cosmetology. Assessments are based on the following criteria:

- a review of the student's transcript and the successful completion of a board-approved competency examination administered by the IECT.

Credit for Previous Education or Training

Our Institute assessment is based on a review of the Prospective student's transcript and the successful completion of a board-approved competency examination administered by IECT. The Prospective student is required to provide a copy of a catalog, bulletin, website, or unofficial transcripts giving the full course description when making the evaluation. The number of credit hours awarded shall not exceed the actual hours of instruction verified on the transcript or the number of hours specified in the board-approved curriculum for a specific topic. Presently we do not accept transfer to enroll into the Esthetics and Master Esthetics Programs.

Prospective student's courses that are deemed to be the academic equivalent to an IECT course, but have less attended clock hours, will be granted full academic hours Instructional credit and Instructional actual clock hour credit. Additional attendance will be required to meet the total Instructional clock hours of the program.

IECT will accept transfer credit or course work from approved institution and will maintain a written record of all previous education and training of the veteran or eligible person. IECT staff will review the applicants' prior training and education and evaluate and compare it to IECT course requirements. The IECT shall make the assessment based on a review of the student's transcript and the successful completion of a board-approved competency examination administered by the IECT. The IECT may also request a copy of a catalog or bulletin giving the full course description when making the evaluation. The number of credit hours awarded shall not exceed the actual hours of instruction verified on the transcript or the number of hours specified in the board-approved curriculum for a specific topic

Standards for Satisfactory Progress (SAPP) 1 of 3

Satisfactory progress is evaluated every week throughout the program.

 \Box The student is required to make quantitative progress toward program completion. To make satisfactory academic progress, a student must attend at least 90% of the scheduled class hours on a cumulative basis during each evaluation period.

 \Box The student's academic average is reviewed to determine qualitative progress. The minimum required is 70% at the conclusion of each evaluation period.

Incomplete grades are not given, and students must repeat any classes in which they earn less than 70% average. The lowest grade will be dropped, and the highest grade will be used to calculate the academic average. Course work repeated may adversely affect a student's academic progress in terms of the maximum time frame.

Students who withdraw from the program will receive a grade of 0% in each class interrupted by the withdrawal. All interrupted classes must be repeated upon readmission to the institution.

• Warning

If a student fails to meet the cumulative 90% attendance or 70% grade average for any evaluation period, or both, he and she will be placed on warning for the next evaluation period. Failure to achieve a 90% attendance or a 70% grade average, or both, at the end of the warning period will result in the administrative withdrawal of the student.

Students will be notified in writing when they are placed on warning and the steps necessary to be removed from warning status. Students will also receive attendance or academic counseling, from The IECT Administrator, as appropriate, when they are placed on warning.

The institution will notify a student by certified mail if he or she is being administratively withdrawn for unsatisfactory academic progress.

Standards for Satisfactory Progress 2 of 3 Appeal Process

The student may submit a written appeal of his/her dismissal within five calendar days of their receipt of the dismissal notice. The appeal must be accompanied by documentation of the mitigating circumstances that have prevented the student from attaining satisfactory academic progress and evidence that changes have occurred to allow the student to now meet standards of only extraordinary circumstances will be considered, such as death or severe illness in the immediate family. Before an appeal may be granted, a written academic plan must be provided to the student which clearly identifies a viable plan for the student to successfully complete the program within the maximum timeframe allowed.

The IECT Administrator, Saphonia Gee, will assess all appeals and determine whether the student may be permitted to continue in school on a warning status, despite not meeting the satisfactory progress requirements. The student will be sent the written decision within ten days of the Institute's receipt of the appeal. The decision of The IECT Administrator, Saphonia Gee, is final.

Students reinstated upon appeal are on probationary status for the next evaluation period, during which time they must meet the terms and conditions set out in The IECT Administrator's letter granting the appeal. At the end of the evaluation period, and at the end of every evaluation period thereafter, the student's academic status will be reviewed. The student may continue on probation as long as he or she meets the terms of the academic plan approved at the time the student's appeal was granted, until such time as satisfactory academic progress status is regained.

• Maximum Time Frame (MTF)

All program requirements must be completed within a maximum time frame of 1.5 times the normal program length, as measured in calendar time. For example, the Esthetics course e.g., 13 weeks in length, must be completed within 19.5 calendar weeks. Time spent on an approved leave of absence is not counted against the maximum time frame. Students exceeding the maximum time frame will be administratively withdrawn.

• Transfer and Readmitted

Transferring Students from outside the institution will be evaluated qualitatively only on the work completed while at the Institute. The maximum time frame is reduced for transfer students, based upon the remaining length of the program in which they enroll.

If the student transfers in 280 hours, and therefore must complete 320 hours at the Institute (320/40 hours per week = 8 weeks), the maximum time frame is 8 weeks x 150% or 12 weeks.

Standards for Satisfactory Progress 3 of 3

Ninety percent (90%) attendance and completion of all tests and practical exercises at a "C" (70% or better) proficiency level is required for satisfactory progress. Excused absences will require make-up activity as directed by the instructor.

Academic credit (military service)

- Students forced to withdraw due to military service will be issued a pending grade of "In Progress" until the course is completed.
- Students will have 5 years from the completion of military service to complete the course.

Re-instatement (military service)

- Upon release or return from military service, military students shall be entitled to reinstatement to IECT without having to re-qualify for admission provided:
 - a) The student returns to IECT after a cumulative absence of not more than five years, and
 - b) The student provides notice of intent to return to the institution not later than three years after the completion of active service.
- Military students will be reinstated in the same program of study in which he or she had been enrolled prior to withdrawal.
- Counseling for the student will be provided to determine the impact of the student's absence from the program on the ability to resume study and to advise the student of his or her options when a program is no longer available or suitable.

Documentation (military service)

- In order to preserve their prerogatives under the reinstatement policy, a student must provide documentation which reflects the date of discharge from active or reserve duty, e.g., DD214, orders to the Fleet Reserve.
- Students must provide documentation within three years of discharge from active or reserve duty.

Student Rights, Privileges and Responsibilities

Medical Resignations

A student withdrawing for medical reasons will be charged an amortized daily tuition rate for each day enrolled. Request for withdrawal for medical reasons must be accompanied by a statement from the attending physician.

Standards of Progress Policy Students SAP policy - performance

Throughout the course, weekly written tests and weekly practical performance tests will be administered to ascertain student capture and retention of course information. Students failing to pass weekly performance assessments (written tests or practical exercises) will be placed in an academic probation status. Students in this status will receive a written explanation regarding their substandard performance as well as a written Remediation Plan specific to the situation. Students in remediation status will receive personalized training until they demonstrate proficient performance and are at the same level as their classmates.

• For all students, alternate arrangements for continuing attendance, without termination from The IECT will be made to make up the hours, at the discretion of the Director of Education, by mutual agreement of all parties concerned.

- Provide treatment only when there is reasonable expectation that will be advantageous to the client.
- Consistently maintain and improve professional knowledge and competence while striving for professional excellence through regular assessment of personal and professional strengths and weaknesses and through continued education and training.
- Conduct their business and profession with honesty and integrity; respect the inherent worth of all persons.
- Refuse to discriminate against clients or other health professionals.
- Safeguard the confidentiality of all client information, unless disclosure is required by law, court order or is absolutely necessary for the protection of the public.
- Respect the client's right to treatment/services with informed and voluntary consent. The student or practitioner will record the informed consent of the client or client's advocate, before providing treatment
- Respect the client's right to refuse, modify or terminate treatment regardless of prior consent given.
- Provide draping and treatment in a way that ensures the safety, comfort, and privacy of the client.
- Exercise the right to refuse to treat any persons or any part of their body for just and reasonable cause.
- Refrain, in all circumstances, from engaging in any sexual contact.
- Avoid any interest, activity or influence which might be in conflict with the practitioner's obligation to act in the best interests of the client or profession
- Respect the client's boundaries with regard to privacy, disclosure, exposure, emotional expression, beliefs, and the client's reasonable expectations of professional behavior.
- Refuse any gifts or benefits, which are intended to influence a referral, decision or treatment that is purely for per- sonal gain and not for the good of the client.

Student Records Policy 1of 2

The IECT uses electronic record keeping in compliance with the Board regulation requirements. Board regulation <u>18 VAC 41-70-230.A</u> states "Schools shall maintain on the premises of each school and available for inspection by the board..." specified records for the students (including enrollment documents, student attendance, clock hour, and academic records). If you are storing electronic copies of all of your student records, and all of the required records are immediately accessible on the premises at that location. IECT are responsible for ensuring that all required records are available on the premises for inspection by the department. If the IECT required documents are not accessible at each school, we are subject to disciplinary action. A student record will contain a complete history of all correspondence between the student and IECT, including enrollment and financial data. All student tests (and test results), evaluations and grades will be maintained by IECT on-site for a period of 5 years. Student transcripts will be kept on file permanently. All paper records will be converted to electronic documents and archived. The paper documents will be stored in a secure and controlled area with limited access. Access to electronic records will be limited to The IECT Administrator, Saphonia Gee, or the

Board for Barbers and Cosmetology of Virginia if she is unavailable. IECT employs on-site and off-site computer backup and storage.

Students seeking a copy of any of their academic records can submit an e-mail request or written request, at their convenience.

- Electronic requests will receive a written reply to within 5-7 business days Requestors will be required to provide specific security information in order to obtain records from IECT.
- IECT school and student records are maintained and safeguarded against loss or damage during their enrollment and for a minimum of five years after graduation or disenrollment.
- IECT guarantees each Student (or parent/guardian if dependent minor) access to his/her own Student records within 21 days of written request.
- We require written consent from the student or guardian for release of records in response to each third-party request unless otherwise required by law.

Student Records Policy 2of 2

For Veterans: Any students (veterans or eligible persons) attending classes using their GI Bill® should note that the Virginia State Approving Agency (SAA), All student record will contain a complete history of all correspondence between the student and IECT, including enrollment and financial data. All student tests (and test results), evaluations and grades will be maintained by IECT on-site in a locked office cabinet for a period of 5 years. Student transcripts will be kept on file permanently. All paper records will be converted to electronic documents and archived. The paper documents will be stored in a secure and controlled area with limited access

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's education records. These rights transfer to the student when he or she reaches the age of 18 or attends a school beyond the high school level. Students to whom the rights have transferred are "eligible students."

- Parents or eligible students have the right to inspect and review the student's education records maintained by the IECT. Schools are not required to provide copies of records unless, for reasons such as great distance, it is impossible for parents or eligible students to review the records. Schools may charge a fee for copies.
- Parents or eligible students have the right to request that a school correct their record which they believe to be inaccurate or misleading. If The IECT decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student then has the right to a formal hearing. After the hearing, if The IECT still decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student has the right to place a statement with the record setting forth his or her view about the contested information.
- Generally, schools must have written permission from the parent or eligible student in order to release any information from a student's education record.
- However, FERPA allows schools to disclose those records, without consent, to the following parties or under the following conditions (34 CFR § 99.31):
 - School officials with legitimate educational interest.
 - Other schools to which a student is transferring.
 - Specified officials for audit or evaluation purposes.
 - Appropriate parties in connection with financial aid to a student.
 - Organizations conduct certain studies for or on behalf of the IECT.
 - Accrediting organizations.
 - To comply with a judicial order or lawfully issued subpoena.
 - Appropriate officials in cases of health and safety emergencies; and
 - State and local authorities, within a juvenile justice system, pursuant to specific State law.

Schools may disclose, without consent, "directory" information such as a student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, honors and awards, and dates of attendance. However, schools must tell parents and eligible students about directory information and allow parents and eligible students a reasonable amount of time to request that The IECT not disclose directory information about them. Schools must notify parents and eligible students annually of their rights under FERPA. The actual means of notification (special letter, inclusion in a PTA bulletin, student handbook, or newspaper article) is left to the discretion of each school.

Academic Integrity Performance

Institute of Epidermal Cell Therapy recognizes its students as responsible and capable adults and citizens preparing for a career. Tardiness

Tardiness is defined for this purpose as a student entering a scheduled and published classroom meeting more than 5 minutes after the scheduled and published time. Online meetings are primarily asynchronous in nature and tardiness will not be calculated for that modality. Students who clock out before the scheduled class end time will be considered having an early departure. Tardies and early departures may be excused if the student provides documentation including, but not limited to, medical notes, or legal-related documentation. Additional tardies or early departures may result in suspension at the discretion of the administration.

Excessive absences, tardies and/or early departures may result in probation, suspension, or termination from the program.

- Students are expected to be on time and attend all scheduled classes. Tardiness is defined as showing up more than 10 minutes late for the beginning of a classroom or practical event. The tardiness of one individual affects the entire class tenor and will be strongly and actively discouraged. *Tardiness without a legitimate reason on more than three separate occasions will be considered one unexcused absence*.
- Attendance will be documented at the IECT time, which will be maintained in the student records.

Removal from enrollment may place a student on probation or in academic dismissal status. Excused Absences and Dismissals:

IECT considers an excused absence or dismissal. Excused Absences

Absences that fall within a maximum of 10% of the program hours are considered excused absences and students are not required to make up the hours. No documentation for these absences is required for them to be considered excused. Excused absences do not apply to courses or programs requiring 100% attendance.

Students who are absent for more than 14 consecutive calendar days will be withdrawn. The withdrawal process will begin on the 15th day of absence, and the drop will be completed within five business days. Breaks between terms are not included in the 14 consecutive calendar days calculation.

Unexcused Absences:

The IECT considers an unexcused absence. Excused absences will be granted for extenuating circumstances only. Excused absences must be substantiated by entries in the student's file. Early departures, absences, tardiness, etc., for any portion of a class period will be counted as one quarter (1/4) absence. Students exceeding three (3) days in a month of unexcused absences will be terminated from their VA benefits for unsatisfactory attendance. The student's attendance record will be retained in the veteran's file for USDVA and SAA audit purposes.

Student Attendance Notification Procedures:

Students with 80-89% cumulative attendance at an assessment point are placed on attendance monitoring status. Students are notified of their attendance monitoring status via the Academic and Attendance Progress reports that are distributed to students at the Determination of Satisfactory Attendance assessment points. A copy of this report is placed in the students' files. Students placed on attendance monitoring should meet with the Education staff. To review what courses, need to be made up. Education staff will have regular follow up with these students to review progress toward program completion. Once a student has achieved 90% or above cumulative attendance, he/she will be removed from attendance monitoring status at the next assessment point.

Disciplinary Action for Violation of Attendance:

Students at 69% or below cumulative attendance at an official assessment point are placed on attendance probation. Students are notified of their attendance probation status via the Academic and Attendance Progress reports that are distributed to students at the Determination of Satisfactory Attendance assessment points. A copy of this report is placed in the students' files. Students placed on attendance probation have eight weeks to achieve at least 80% cumulative attendance. Education staff will have regular follow up with these students to review progress toward program completion.

Students can improve their cumulative attendance percentage by attending needed make-up and/or repeat courses and attending currently scheduled courses. Students who achieve a minimum of 80% cumulative attendance by the next official assessment are removed from attendance probation status. Students who have 69% or below cumulative attendance for two consecutive official attendance assessments are withdrawn from school.

Re-admittance

- A student who has voluntarily dropped out of a training course may be re-admitted within two years by successfully completing a personal interview with The IECT's Administrator, Saphonia Gee and paying all fees due at the time of re-admission. Program requirements at the time of readmission shall be applicable.
- Any student who was academically dismissed may be re-admitted within one year by successfully completing a personal interview with The IECT 's Director for Education, Deborah Waters and paying all fees due at the time of re-admission.
- Program requirements at the time of re-admission shall be applicable.
- Any student who was terminated for misconduct (See "Student Conduct") shall not be readmitted.

Leave of Absence

A student must submit a signed, dated, and attested Request for Leave of Absence form, available in the office of the Director of Education, Deborah Waters. The Director of Education and other Institute officials as designated on the request form must approve the Leave of Absence. The Director of Education will notify the student whether or not the Leave of Absence is approved. Only Leave of Absence will be approved twice in a twelve (12) month period. The form must be completed in advance of the leave unless unforeseen circumstances prevent the student from doing so. If a student does not request a leave of absence within the time frame consistent with the Institute of Epidermal Cell Therapy consecutive absence policy, s/he will be withdrawn. The leave of absence must be between 14 calendar days and 180 calendar days or one-half the published program length (whichever is shorter). The request must be accompanied by appropriate documentation specifying the reason for the request. No additional charges will be assessed for taking a leave of absence alone. In order to reflect a modification in graduation date, a student will be required to sign an addendum to his/her Enrollment Contract upon return from a leave of absence.

Criteria for Leave of Absence 1 of 2

The Institute recognizes that personal situations may arise which may require an extended period of time to resolve. It would not be advantageous to the student to maintain continuous enrollment when conflicting pressures prevent regular attendance. A leave of absence is a temporary break in a student's attendance during which s/he is considered to be continuously enrolled.

1. A leave of absence may be granted for emergency situations such as a serious illness, debilitating injury, or death in the immediate family.

2. A student must submit a written request for a leave of absence in advance of the beginning date of the leave of absence unless unforeseen circumstances prevent the student from doing so. If a student does not request a leave of absence within a timeframe consistent with the institution's consecutive absence policy, s/he must be withdrawn.

3. The student must sign and date the leave of absence request and specify a reason for the leave. The reason must be identified in order for the institution to have a reasonable expectation of the student's return within the timeframe of the leave of absence as requested.

4. The student must attest to understanding the procedures and implications for returning or failing to return to his/her course of study.

5. Leave of Absence requests must be approved by The IECT Director of Education. Deborah of

Waters.

6. The student will not be assessed any additional charges as a result of the leave of absence.7. The length and frequency of leaves of absence must not impede student progress and must be reasonable within the context of the institution's curriculum.

8. A leave of absence must be limited to a maximum of 180 calendar days in any 12-month period or one-half the published program length, whichever is shorter. Multiple leaves of absence may be permitted provided the total of the leaves does not exceed this limit. *Leave of Absence approval 1 of 2*

An approved leave of absence may be extended for an additional period of time provided. that the extension request meets all of the above requirements, and the total length of the leave of absence does not exceed the specified limit.

Leave of Absence approval 2 of 2

- Leaves of absence, including military leaves, shall be reasonable in duration, not to exceed that period stated in the approved catalog, and shall be for specific and acceptable purposes.
- > The IECT attendance records will clearly show leave of absence granted.
- A written request for a leave of absence properly dated and signed by both the student and The IECT director must be placed in the individual student file prior to the effective date of such leave of absence.

Leave of Absence to the Department of Veterans Affairs:

- The IECT certifying official is responsible for reporting Leave of Absence to the Department of Veterans Affairs Regional Processing Office using the Notice of Change in Student Status (VA Form 22-1999b).
- ➤ If the student fails to return from leave, he or she will be automatically terminated, and a refund will be totally consummated within forty (40) days.

Appealing a Denial & Requests for LOA Extensions

If a student receives a denial of a leave of absence, he/she can submit a written appeal to the Campus Director. A letter of explanation and supporting documentation will be submitted. The student will receive notification of the appeal/extension approval or denial within five business days.

Returning From a Leave of Absence

A student must return to school on their scheduled return date. Students should work with the Student Services office before returning to create a class schedule to complete their program. Students must return to the same program and campus from which they took the leave.

Often, due to the student's class schedule needs, a student may need to change class groups upon return from a leave of absence. Classroom transfers for LOA students are coordinated with the Director, who determines which class and schedule best fits the LOA student's remaining program requirements.

Failure to Return from Leave of Absence

Students who do not return to school on their scheduled leave of absence return date will be withdrawn from school. The refund policy will be applied if a student fails to return from a leave of absence. In order to return to school, the student would have to re-enroll. For more information, please refer to the Re-enrollment policy.

Re-instatement (military service)

- Upon release or return from military service, military students shall be entitled to reinstatement to IECT without having to re-qualify for admission provided:
 - a) The student returns to IECT after a cumulative absence of not more than five years, and
 - b) The student provides notice of intent to return to the institution not later than three years after the completion of active service.
- Military students will be reinstated in the same program of study in which he or she had been enrolled prior to withdrawal.
- Counseling for the student will be provided to determine the impact of the student's absence from the program on the ability to resume study and to advise the student of his or her options when a program is no longer available or suitable.

Documentation (military service)

- In order to preserve their prerogatives under the reinstatement policy, a student must provide documentation which reflects the date of discharge from active or reserve duty, e.g., DD214, orders to the Fleet Reserve.
- Students must provide documentation within three years of discharge from active or reserve duty.

The IECT attests to providing covered individuals enrolled at the institution's notification no later than 15 days after the date the institution determines tuition and fees rate changes.

Right to cancel

As a result of the Truth in Lending Act (TILA) of 2009, Scholarships & Financial Aid must allow a full three business days right to cancel period after the signed promissory note is submitted before funds can be released to your student account. This will create a delay in your ability to receive short-term loan funds. This requirement became effective February 14, 2010.

Truth-in-Lending (TILA) statement meaning 1 of 2 What Does Truth in Lending Act - TILA Mean?

A federal law was enacted in 1968 with the intention of protecting consumers in their dealings with lenders and creditors. The Truth in Lending Act was implemented by the Federal Reserve through a series of regulations.

The most important aspects of the act concern the pieces of information that must be disclosed to a borrower prior to extending credit: annual percentage rate (APR), term of the loan and total costs to the borrower. This information must be conspicuous on documents presented to the consumer before signing, and also possibly on periodic billing statements.

TILA applies to most types of credit, whether it be closed-end credit (such as an auto loan or mortgage), or open-ended credit (such as a credit card). The act regulates what companies can advertise and say about the benefits of their loans or services. For example, borrowers considering an adjustable-rate mortgage must be offered specific reading materials from the Federal Reserve Board to ensure they understand the parameters of an ARM.

Different states and industries have their own variations of TILA, but the chief feature remains the proper disclosure of key information to protect both the consumer and the lender in credit transactions.

Financial Assistance and Payment Programs

IECT may offer in-house financial assistance payment plan options. Students who carry a balance will be asked to sign an enrollment contract for Services to qualify for no-interest installment payments. These payments will be made in equal installments. No interest will be accrued during the payment period and there will be no penalties for paying in advance. The student will sign a contract payment plan form agree to the following: Truth-in-Lending stating the student agrees to a payment plan for tuition of the program. Tuition payments are due not later than the first day of class. However, IECT policy provides additional financial payment timelines for students, which allows them to make arrangements for installment payments on a weekly basis. All payments must be received by the end of the student's weekly theory period unless other arrangements have been made.

Failure to comply with the rules and regulations set forth by the Institute of Epidermal Cell Therapy will be grounds for termination. Students may make all payments to the Institute of Epidermal Cell Therapy on the agreed upon scheduled payment day and time.

A \$50.00 non-refundable registration fee helps us provide administrative support, student services and career counseling to students and student applicants. We thank you for your support and understanding. Any student more than 10 business days late on tuition payments will not be allowed to attend classes until payment has been made in full. Payments made by credit card are subject to a merchant processing fee. IECT offers Instructor led flexible days three times per month in which the students are allowed to

make-up onsite practical procedures and testing.

Returned Check Policy

It is our policy to retain the old check until a new check is issued and cleared. Full restitution for the unpaid check payment, our returned fees, and the bank's service charges assessed to the Institute of Epidermal Cell Therapy must be received within two business days or the next day of class. The acceptable methods of payment are cash, money order, cashier's check, or credit card (charge of 4% is applied to all credit card payments). Repayment Tuition and Fees

If the tuition is not paid in full by the due date, both transcripts and registration will be blocked until the account is paid in full. Past due tuition is subject to all necessary collection fees, attorney fees, higher interest rates, as well as a negative credit report to a national credit bureau.

Cancellation and Refund Policy

Rejection: An applicant rejected by The IECT is entitled to a refund of all monies paid.

Program Cancellation: If IECT cancels a program subsequent to a student's enrollment, we will refund all monies paid by the student.

Cancellation Prior to the Start of Class or No Show: If an accepted applicant cancels prior to the start of scheduled classes or never attends class (no-show), the student is due a refund of all monies paid.

Three-Day Cancellation: An applicant who provides written notice of cancellation within three (3) business days, excluding weekends and holidays, of executing the Enrollment Agreement is entitled to a refund of all monies paid.

Other Cancellations: An Applicant requesting cancellation more than three (3) days after executing the Enrollment Agreement and making an initial payment, but prior to the first day of class, is entitled to a refund of all monies paid.

Withdrawal Procedure

- A. A student choosing to withdraw from The IECT after the commencement of classes must notify in writing, by phone, verbally, or by another acceptable form of communication, The IECT Administrator, Saphonia Gee, of his/her intentions. The notice must include the expected last date of attendance and be signed and dated by the student.
- B. If *special circumstances* arise, a student may request, in writing, a leave of absence, which should include the date the student anticipates the leave period beginning and ending. The student will confer with The IECT Administrator, Saphonia Gee, to determine a re-convene date, if possible. If no rescheduling arrangements can be made, the official withdrawal date will be the date the student departs for a leave of absence.
- C. A student will be determined to be withdrawn from The IECT if the student misses 5 consecutive instructional days and all of the days are unexcused.
- D. All refund requests must be submitted within 45 days of the determination of the withdrawal date.

Refunds Policy:

a. Refund amounts must be based on a student's last date of attendance (LDA). When determining the number of weeks completed by the student, the institution may consider a partial week the same as if a whole week were completed, provided the student was present at least one day during the scheduled week.

b. During the first week of classes, tuition charges withheld will not exceed 10 percent (10%) of the stated tuition up to a maximum of \$1,000.

c. After the first week and through fifty percent (50%) of the period of financial obligation, tuition charges retained will not exceed a pro rata portion of tuition for the training period completed, plus an administrative fee associated with withdrawal or termination not to exceed \$100.

d. After fifty percent (50%) of the period of financial obligation is completed by the student, the institution may retain the full tuition for that period.

e. When calculating a refund, the percentage of tuition retained by the IECT will be based on the portion of the program the student was attending through his or her last date of attendance when the student dropped, not the tuition charged for the entire program listed on the enrollment agreement.

Date of Determination (DOD): The final date the student attends class. The date the student notifies The IECT of his or her withdrawal, or the date the institution terminates or administratively withdraws the student.

Refund Due Dates:

IECT has and maintains a policy for the refund of the amount charged for tuition, fees, and other charges for a portion of the course that does not exceed the approximate pro rata portion of the total charges for tuition, fees, and other charges that the length of the completed portion of the course bears to the total length.

If an applicant never attends class (no-show) or cancels the contract prior to the class start date, all refunds due must be made within thirty (30) calendar days of the first scheduled day of class or the date of cancellation, whichever is earlier.

For an enrolled student, the refund due will be calculated using the last date of attendance (LDA) and be paid within thirty (30) calendar days from the documented date of determination (DOD). The date of determination is the date the student gives written or verbal notice of withdrawal to the institution or the date the institution terminates the student, by applying the institution's attendance, conduct, or Satisfactory Academic Progress policy.

If a student provides advanced notice of withdrawal such that the 30-day window for the last date of attendance, the refund will be paid within thirty (30) calendar days from the last date of attendance.

IECT may charge a sum which does not vary more than 10 percent from the exact pro rata portion of such tuition, fees, and other charges (See sample refund chart below).

Graduation Requirements

Should the student fail to pass either part, they will be given an opportunity to take a refresher course in the area of deficiency and subsequently be allowed to retake the final examination at no

extra cost. The duration of the refresher course will be determined by the instructor but shall be no longer than three contiguous days. If a second failure is experienced, the student will be required to (re)take the full course and pay the appropriate tuition and fees for the second course. Esthetics Program 600 Hour Course 600 Hour Course – Classroom Method & Online Blended Method

Overview

A program that prepares individuals to cleanse, depilate, massage, and beautify the human body and to function as licensed estheticians and skin care specialists. Includes instruction in skin anatomy, physiology, and health; principles of nutrition; decontamination and infection control; health and safety; facial and body treatment; body wrapping and spa treatments; temporary hair removal including waxing and tweezing; color and skin analysis; client consultation and care; applicable laws and regulations; business practices; and sometimes related alternative healing regimens.

Prerequisites

Prospective students must submit a completed application and registration fee. Proof of a high school diploma, GED or college transcript must be provided.

Esthetics Industry

The Esthetics Program prepares you for a career at day and resort spas, full-service salons, and skin care clinics. The course covers all aspects of skin care, make-up and holistic health and consists of 600 clock hours of technical instruction, this includes lecture, demonstration, and classroom participation. Successful completion of this course and State licensure all the esthetician to perform manual and electronic facials, eyebrow shaping, hair removal (other than by electrolysis), make up artistry and skin care product representation. An Esthetician has the training and scope of practice that allows him/her to treat the epidermis.

Esthetician according to the Code of Virginia

Esthetics" includes, but is not limited to, the following practices of administering cosmetic treatments to enhance or improve the appearance of the skin: cleansing, toning, performing effleurage or other related movements, stimulating, exfoliating, or performing any other similar procedure on the skin of the human body or scalp by means of cosmetic preparations, treatments, or any non-laser device, whether by electrical, mechanical, or manual means, for care of the skin; applying make-up or eyelashes to any person, tinting or perming eyelashes and eyebrows, and lightening hair on the body except the scalp; and removing unwanted hair from the body of any person by the use of any non-laser device, by tweezing, or by use of chemical or mechanical means. However, "esthetics" is not a healing art and shall not include any practice, activity, or treatment that constitutes the practice of medicine, osteopathic medicine, or chiropractic. The terms "healing arts," "practice of medicine," "practice of osteopathic medicine," and "practice of chiropractic" shall mean the same as those terms are defined in § 54.1-2900. CIP Definition for Aesthetician/Esthetician and Skin Care Specialist

18 VAC 41-70-190. Curriculum and Hours of Instruction Requirements.

Each esthetics school shall submit with its application a curriculum including, but not limited to, a course syllabus, a detailed course content outline, a sample of five lessons plans, a sample of evaluation methods to be used, and a breakdown of hours or credit hours and performances for all courses to be taught that will lead to licensure or certification. In addition, if a school awards credit in accordance with subsection D of this section, The IECT shall submit copies of the assessment policy, method of evaluation of transcripts and the examination to be used in making the assessment.



REMEMBER:

Withdraw Policy

A student wishing to withdraw from an esthetics course with a grade of "W" must do so before 75% of days the course meets have passed. The student must secure the signature of the instructor on the withdrawal form.

All examinations will be completed and taken in the traditional brick and mortar classroom. Non-Traditional Classroom Education, include the following courses: orientation, school Policies, state laws and regulations, health and safety, personal hygiene, sanitation and sterilization, ethics, salon/shop/parlor/spa Management, analyzing skin or scalp conditions, anatomy, client consultation, and care of equipment.

Accommodations for Students with Special Needs

Institute of Epidermal Cell Therapy Classroom and Online Classroom Policies

The Board has not previously enforced this requirement. To assist the Department with these audits, the Board for Barbers and Cosmetology will now enforce this requirement and has issued guidance regarding the regulatory requirement for schools to submit their student rosters to the board, as follows.

- 1. Rosters must be submitted quarterly, with rosters due on January 15, April 15, July 15, and October 15 every year. The roster will be current within 15 days of the submission. For example, the January 15 roster will be current through December 31.
- 2. Rosters will include all students enrolled in the school as well as any students who completed, withdrew, or were terminated in the past six months. Students who are enrolled but have not begun classes must be included in the report.
- 3. Rosters will be provided on a Board supplied spreadsheet, which will include the students full name, date of birth, program type, date enrolled, the total number of hours to-date, and the date completed, terminated, or withdrew (if applicable).
- 4. Schools with no students enrolled, but the intention of operating must submit a report to that effect. Schools with no students enrolled that no longer wish to operate should terminate their license in accordance with Board regulations.
- Rosters must be submitted via a secure link provided by the Board. The submission process uploads the roster into a secure site that can only be accessed by board staff and is FERPA compliant (if applicable to your school).
- 6. In each calendar year, schools will not be penalized on their first instance of reporting after the deadline, provided the report is provided within 15 days of the deadline. Subsequent late filings or failing to report within 15 days of the deadline will result in a referral for disciplinary action.

The secure link for submitting rosters is below. Schools will begin submitting the roster on January 15, 2023. The Board will allow schools to submit their first submission of student rosters by January 31, 2023, due to the Board's delay in providing the secure link. Late filings for the January 2023 submission received after January 31, 2023, will result in a referral for disciplinary action.

Most schools divide the 600 hours curriculum into theory hours and practical hours, and have their students complete the performances during their practical hours.

Regarding students taking both the basic and master esthetics program, the Board can offer the following information. The Board's regulations do not provide for a combined 1200-hour esthetics and master esthetics program. Your school has been approved to teach a 600-hour esthetics program and a 600- hour master esthetics program. Students should complete the esthetics program prior to starting the master esthetics program and should receive program completion documents after completing each program. That being said, the Board does not prohibit schools from signing up students for both programs at the same time, as long as it is clear to the students that they are signing up for two separate programs, and they are not misled about the nature of the programs.

15. How does IECT explain their process of awarding credit students?

The Department of Professional and Occupational Regulation Board for Barbers and Cosmetology (Virginia) Requirement

Under Board regulations 18 VAC 41-70-210 Board Regulation 18 VAC 41-70-190 lays out the curriculum requirements for esthetics and master esthetics programs. Section D allows schools to conduct an assessment of a student's competence and, based on the assessment, award up to 300 hours of credit towards the program. This is allowed for both esthetics and master esthetics.

Section D also explains that the assessment is to be based on a review of the student's transcripts and a board approved competency examination. The number of hours awarded cannot exceed the actual hours of instruction verified on the transcript or the number of hours specified in the curriculum. These provisions have the following effects:

 Students can only be awarded credit for prior training in a school (must be based on transcripts). IECT's esthetics student interest in enrolling into master esthetics while in esthetics program may request an official transcript to submit with their master esthetics application. per

- 2. Schools must have a Board approved assessment exam prior to awarding any credit. IECT is a board approved for esthetics and master esthetics competency exam classroom program.
- 3. Schools cannot award more hours towards a topic than were obtain in the prior training.
- 4. Schools cannot award more hours towards a topic than allowed under in the curriculum.

The regulation does not specify where these hours may come from, beyond that they would need to be from a school. This allows for schools with esthetics and master esthetics program to award credit towards the master esthetics program based on their own esthetics program.

However, these hours would be severely limited. The school cannot award more hours towards a specific topic than earned towards that in the prior training and a school cannot award more hours beyond what is approved towards a specific topic. This means that only the hours a student obtained towards a specific topic in the esthetics program can count towards that same topic in the master program. Because there are few topics that overlap between these programs, substantially less than 300 hours could be awarded towards a master program based on esthetics training.
